

Best Suites



THE I.M. PEI-DESIGNED FOUR SEASONS Hotel New York is home to some of Manhattan's most stunning suites, including the new \$50 million Ty Warner Penthouse, named for the hotel's owner and designed by Peter Marino. Priced at \$30,000 per night and inclusive of all hotel services and amenities, the nine-room, 4,300 square-foot suite is located atop the 52-story hotel.

Accessed by a private elevator, the Ty Warner Penthouse features a library, living room, master bedroom, and spa, each with a distinctive design aesthetic, floor-to-ceiling bay windows, cantilevered glass balconies, vaulted ceilings, and skylights. In addition, the suite offers a zen garden, breakfast room, powder room, dressing room, and master bathroom. Guests will marvel at the suite's specially commissioned décor and one-of-a-kind furniture, which boast semi-precious stone surfaces, hand-applied straw marquetry, hand-painted lacquer panels, and custom-designed fabrics woven with threads of platinum, gold, and silver. The suite also includes unlimited use of a Rolls Royce or Mercedes Maybach, a personal trainer, and full spa treatments, as well as 24-7 personal butler services.

Four Seasons Hotel New York

Located on the 51st floor and priced at \$17,000 per night, the Four Seasons' Presidential Suites allow guests to take in views of the Manhattan skyline through floor-to-ceiling bay windows and from balconies positioned on the building's corners. Each of the two suites has a distinct personality: Suite 5101 features an opulent, masculine library with oversized leather club chairs, walls with embossed leather panels, and a marble hearth streaked in shades of toffee and magenta. The coffee-colored, swirl-patterned carpet covers a floor of ebonized wood. In Suite 5102, the living room features cream-colored credenzas; customized gilt and lacquer game tables, chairs, and fixtures; and a baby grand piano.

Measuring more than 2,000 square feet and located on the hotel's privately accessed 32nd floor, the Royal Suite is priced at \$12,000 per night and features two bedrooms and an adjoining library, which can function as a third

bedroom as needed. The suite also includes a spacious living room, a terrace, and three and a half bathrooms, as well as generous closets. With subtly colored natural silks, linens, and wools and light Oriental woods throughout, the Royal Suite's décor evokes the atmosphere of a luxurious private apartment. Silver-leafed elevator doors, leather-paneled headboards, goat-skinned walls, marble floors, and a mother of pearl chandelier are among the suite's specialty finishes and furnishings. In addition, the suite's extensive technological offering – which includes seven flat-screen televisions, DVD players, and a premium system – is user friendly for guests, and the wiring and connection sites have been skillfully concealed to enhance the suite's interior design. ●
